## From the CEO's Table

This year was very special for QMed. We had a big Undergraduate events list – the conferences – Medicon at Lucknow, SIMSCON (at Manakula Vinayagar, Puducherry), Illuminati (at AFMC, Pune), SPLASH (at Lady Hardinge, Delhi) and an event at the Grant Medical College, Mumbai. We had special workshops for the Rotaract Club of Caduceus, Mumbai and Quest – at Mumbai, Pune and Bangalore.

We did something unusual for Postgraduate residents this year. We raised funds via ImpactGuru, so that we could do workshops for small groups, teach them thoroughly and support them for their thesis too. We had a target of 100 PG residents to help out.

Other first were - We did one event for Librarians at the Aravind Eye Hospital at Pondicherry. For the first time I conducted a workshop over Skype for someone overseas – at Melaka, Malaysia. Then I delivered a lecture over a webinar, which was attended by 450 people. We did a collaborative workshop for the first time – with "The Union" (IUATLD) at Delhi.

Overall, this financial year was a period of intense activity. We participated in and conducted close to 93 workshops and lectures, covering an audience of about 3200 students, professionals, librarians, and others in the extended healthcare family.

And while one or more of us attends various events for NGOs, I would like to highlight an event by the Centre for Advancement of Philanthropy – the "Compliance Complete Conference". One of the speakers was Ms Usha Menon from Singapore. She spoke about fundraising and I loved this explanation of hers - "Fundraising is neither about asking, nor about money. We need to find the right donors who will work with us, believing in our causes, and then contribute a mix of good will, time and money"

That was thought provoking! We are really grateful for several such learning opportunities. Do read the rest of the report and I hope you enjoy what we have to share.

### **WORKSHOPS**

This year, we conducted 33 workshops and reached out to an audience of over 408 between April 1, 2016 and March 30, 2017. The participants included - PG students, varied health professionals and librarians. Our efforts towards UG students in various healthcare streams were centered on teaching PubMed and Reference management using Mendeley. We taught an audience of 50 in QUEST, Bangalore; 35 in ILLUMINATI, Pune; 15 in SIMSCON 2016, Pondicherry; 18 in MEDICON 2016, Lucknow. Our QUEST workshops spanned Pune, Mumbai and Bangalore.


During 2016-17, we collected funds from the public for our 100 PGs project. The motive was to train and help PG Students with the literature search and reference management component of their dissertations. We conducted five workshops between January and March, 2017; covering PubMed Basics and Reference Management. The venue was Seth GS Medical College and KEM Hospital, and we gathered an audience of 29 PG students

- 1. Our other attendees were a mix of students, librarians, employed/in-practice health professionals. They hailed from Government Medical College, Patiala (41); Aditya Jyot Eye Hospital, Mumbai (11); Sri Manakula Vinayagar Medical College and Hospital, Pondicherry (26); and King George's Medical University, Lucknow (26).
- 2. At QMed, we also commit to teaching individuals or small groups, should they require our assistance. Among many others, we conducted two such sessions for a UG student on 21<sup>st</sup> and 22<sup>nd</sup> December, 2016, and one from K.B. Bhabha Hospital, Mumbai on 21/05/2016. We taught a PG student of Seth GS Medical College and KEM Hospital on 03/08/2016, three from KEM on 7/05/2016 again on 3/08/2016 and one from the DY Patil School of Ayurveda on 14/04/2016.
- 3. We aided Dr. K. N. Sumanth from Malaysia with searching for studies and reference management via two Skype calls in May, 2016.
- 4. All in all, while we conducted our workshops in different parts of the country like Pune, Delhi, Jodhpur, Pondicherry and Lucknow, our coverage remained the most intense in Mumbai.

## **LECTURES**


We delivered close to **60 lectures** to an audience of about **2791** in this financial year.


- 1. In these lectures, we taught literature search and reference management
- 2. Our UG students participated in our lectures at venues such as the Rotaract Club of the Caduceus, Mumbai (50 participants, 24/10/2016), Lady Hardinge Medical College, Delhi (40 participants, 26/09/2016) and Grant Medical College & Sir JJ Groups of Hospitals (40 participants, 02/08/2016). - 3. Our PG students heard us at places like Ayurveda Mahavidyalaya, Sion (50 participants, 22/03/2017), YMT Medical colleges (100 participants), ESI-PGIMSR Andheri East (14 participants, 25/02/2017) and AYJNIHH: Ali Yavar Jung National Institute for the Hearing Handicapped (40 participants, 07/12/2016).
- 4. We delivered a lecture at the Aravind Eye Hospital in Pondicherry on 19<sup>th</sup> and 20<sup>th</sup> November 2016. This was a special lecture for only librarians, where we taught Reference Management with Mendeley and literature searching.
- 5. Our activity spanned Mumbai, Pune, Delhi, Thane, Nashik, Chennai, Ahmedabad, Coimbatore and Pondicherry.
- 6. On 7/06/2016, we delivered a lecture- "IT and the Medical Professional" in the Mumbai University for 50 participants.
- 7. We hosted a webinar at the All India Opthalmological Society on 21/07/2016. The topic was on literature search, and it attracted an audience of 450.






#### **HEAR FROM OUR PARTICIPANTS!**



# LECTURES/ WORKSHOPS/ SEMINARS WE PARTICIPATED IN FOR FURTHER LEARNING

- The Centre for Advancement of Philanthropy organized a conference for NGOs on 16/04/2016.
  The theme was compliance- that it is not just placing a tick against a defined set of rules. The ethos of compliance was discussed by expert panelists for a range of topics like Finance, Governance, HR and so forth.
- 2. A Capacity Building Workshop on Sexual Harassment Policies was organized by the CAP on 21/09/2016. The necessity of drafting a policy and informing every employee about the same and how they could use it if necessary was highlighted.
- 3. The India CSR summit was a two day affair, spread through 27<sup>th</sup> and 28<sup>th</sup> September, 2016. Panel Discussions gave us an understanding of CSR activities in India. We also got to take part in teaching sessions, and intense networking opportunities. The most important thing we carried back with us was the knowledge that companies are serious about finding good NGOs to work with. Another important take-away was the Google for Non Profits session. If this is of interest to you, you can learn more at google.co.in/nonprofits.
- 4. A session of Board Governance for NGOs commenced on 19/10/2016. It was organized by the CAP and helped about 30 NGO founders/senior members revisit the skeleton frame of what an NGO Board should be about. Roles and responsibilities of board members were discussed, as well as the conundrum that constitutes the relationship between governance and legality.
- 5. NCHPE 2016 saw us participate in two preconference workshops, on Experimental learning and reflective practices, and another on Medical Humanities. Both were of great interest, covering issues under themes such as the "Theatre of the Oppressed" where participants did activities to get out of regular patterns. The theme of the conference was Professionalism.
- In January, 2017, QMed participated in two semi- formal events of the Indian Association for Medical Informatics. Brief presentations on Informatics implementation were held at the first, and the second was wan informal meeting held at IIT Bombay.
- 7. On 3/02/2017, we brainstormed with the librarians at the Somaiya group of institutions about conducting activities to aid every library in promoting their library to their users.
- 8. In March, 2017, a one day conference was held on compliance for NGOs, aptly named "Compliance Complete". It was organized by the CAP, who has also hosted the program in 2016. We learnt a lot of new things, and one of the thoughts put forward at the conference that we took back with us was-"Fundraising is neither about asking, nor about money. We need to find the right donors who will work with us, believing in our causes, and then contributing a mix of good will, time and money" (Ms. Usha Menon, a management consultant from Singapore).

### **CHALLENGES**

- At QMed, we try to keep our financial bearings sustainable for both our recipients as well as our organization. Our beneficiaries are students and professionals working with health, and most of them have the means necessary to pay to attend our workshops. Despite, this, we get feedback asking us to reduce costs, or to opt for heavy subsidisation. In turn, this fuddles the institutions and they remain unsure as to whether they should charge the participants. On another spectrum, the rest of the world considers our audience capable enough to pay for the workshops and venues. They therefore do not understand why we should subsidize. All in all, it becomes tough to raise funds from the community since they are acclimatized to only donating to the underprivileged.
- A significant amount of effort in terms of time is expended for each of our workshops. This includes the cost of travelling to the venue. Very often, we have to tailor our presentations so that they fit in the time/ with the audience assigned to us. The time spent mandates that it should be funded, either from the source or elsewhere. However, the amount we find most appropriate is again deemed too high for an individual speaker, and again, the rest of the world feels that our audience knows these issues and readily pays to have them addressed.
- While the institutions have good intentions about conducting workshops, what we teach is usually not given top priority. There are a number of reasons, the prime one being that most feel that they are equipped to conduct literature searches without professional guidance. The positive to this is that we usually receive good feedback after each of our workshops is over, with many stressing on the need for having more of them in repetitions.
- October 2016 also saw us bid farewell to a dear colleague, Lakshmi Padmanabhan, Program Associate. It was with regret that we had to let her go. Lakshmi was an excellent employee who made great contributions to QMed. Unfortunately we could not match her salary needs, with the kinds of constraints we experience. Lakshmi was kind enough to say that she did not expect us to make higher offers, as she was very much aware of our problems. But at her stage of life her monetary needs were higher, and she made the decision to change.
  - Lakshmi had a Bachelor's Degree in Mass Media and a Masters in Social Work. Coming from a background that neither covered health sciences nor Library & Information Sciences, it was commendable that she learned a lot about our core areas Literature searching and Referencing, and was able to teach both very well! She was passionate about QMed and its work, in the span of 3.5 years that she was with us. We wish her all the success in her new job.

To conclude, we see dire necessity to reach out to each medical student, resident, and professional with what we teach. We should be holding three of more workshops a week! We cannot do with just feedback telling us they wish what we taught was in the curriculum, or that they would have learnt it all earlier. These wishes should get translated into more workshops.
