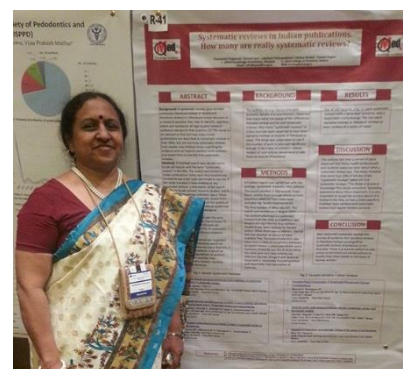
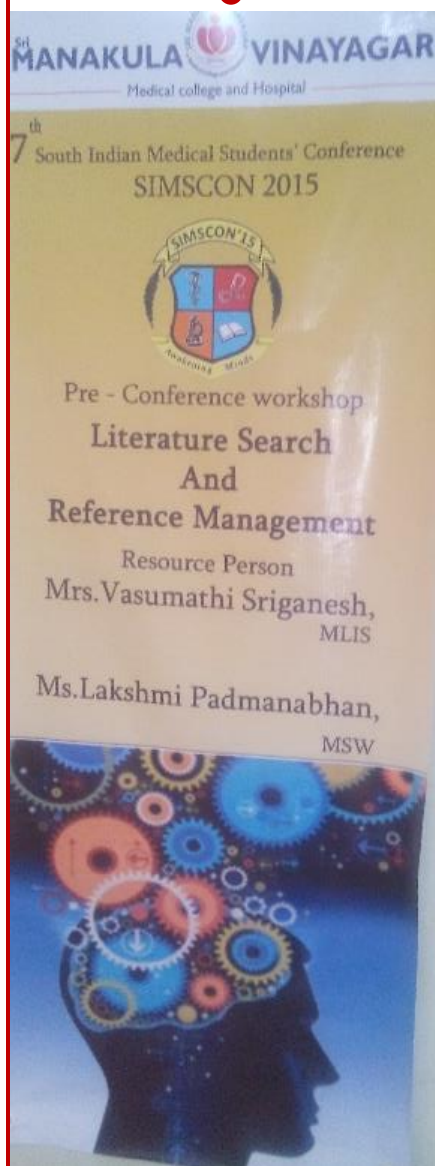


ANNUAL REPORT 2015-2016

A year of many firsts for QMed



From The CEO's Desk

Welcome to the Eighth Annual Report of QMed Knowledge Foundation! This year we experienced the feeling of “the break of a dawn and lights beginning to glow” as several of our dreams are coming true. One of our major dreams and priorities is for Undergraduate students of medicine (and health sciences). This year, we conducted seven workshops for this group! We wanted to raise our levels of help to assist Systematic Reviewers and Guideline developers. We worked with three such teams (one – an international group)! We believe that our skills should help rural India, and I had the good fortune to help an excellent team of rural health care professionals. In the last few years, I worked with one International team – MECOR of the American Thoracic Society, for conducting workshops. This year, thanks to the exposure at the Cochrane Colloquium, I was part of one more workshop coordinated by an International Group – from The Union (formerly IUATLD) - on systematic reviews. A further ripple effect happened was - we had more invitations to conduct workshops, by participants of these events, at their own institutions. From only three workshops last year, we soared – to doing 19 workshops this year. We believe that in the coming years, the numbers will rise, as I also have got the status of Specialty Speaker, by the Maharashtra Medical Council.

We still are waiting to see the day when literature searching and referencing are an integral part of the curriculum. We hope that our E-Learning programs (which we still had issues with, in launching, but will surely happen this year) will contribute towards this!

I would like to express gratitude to all individuals who funded us. We raised over \$9000/- (about Rs.Six lakhs) from overseas, and nine lakhs fifty thousand from donations within India.

But our real needs to speed up our activities are to the tune of about Rs. 40 lakhs for the next year. And we need support to raise this!

I am grateful for what we have been able to do for the medical community, which in turn helps the health of the nation.

All the good in the year gone by

1. We conducted workshops at six under-graduate medical conferences across India.
2. The Maharashtra Medical Council, listed Ms. Vasumathi Sriganesh as a Specialty Speaker for its Continuing Medical Education programs!
3. The Cochrane Colloquium's Training Activity the 'Cochrane ClassMate', has collaborated with us for testing their training. The details are mentioned on the **Cochrane Training Page-** <http://training.cochrane.org/TIF>.
4. Ms. Vasumathi Sriganesh's involvement was sought by three teams working on writing systematic reviews and guidelines. We are glad that 'literature searching' is getting the importance that it deserves.
5. We conducted a two-day workshop at Jan Swasthya Sahyog (JSS) in Ganiyari, Bilaspur. This is an initiative in rural and tribal healthcare by a group of doctors from AIIMS Delhi.
6. We conducted our first under-graduate workshop not connected to any event or conference at Seth GS Medical College and KEM Hospital.
7. We presented a poster at the World Association of Medical Editors (WAME) 2015 titled "Systematic Reviews in Indian Publications, how many really are systematic review?"
8. Ms. Vasumathi Sriganesh's lecture at MECOR got introduced by the organizers as "we cannot think of doing MECOR without QMed" and her lecture was video-taped as well.
9. Dr. Diana Schmidt, a member of the Indian Association for Medical Informatics and a retired professor from Germany visited us. She has been interested in QMed's work for quite some time and has donated to us on several occasions.
10. We set up an account in Instamojo for enabling Indian donors to donate using the options of credit cards / debit cards or netbanking facilities.
11. We got a first guest blog published on QMed blogs by an under-graduate student from Seth GS Medical College and KEM Hospital.

Involvement with a surgical team in the UK for the development of a guideline

Vasumathi Sriganesh was invited to join a team of surgeons in the UK, who were working on developing a guideline. Interestingly, usually she is asked to be involved in searching the literature however this group requested her to be involved in selecting studies from the search results, and for the task of data extraction.

The second half of 2015 had Vasumathi work at selecting possible titles from over 5000 search results, and then selecting from about 800 plus abstracts. She had excellent guidance from a Research Methods expert, and this project will now enable her to guide others to adopt similar methods while working on Systematic Reviews and Guideline development.

At the time of writing, the data extraction has not yet started, but we look forward to learning this process and hope to help similar projects in India, with our learning

We also express gratitude for the donation given by this group, to QMed!

Important learnings in this project

1. While choosing from the titles, first only discard the 100% irrelevant titles.
2. While choosing from the abstracts, keep handy the overall topic details, inclusion / exclusion criteria and any important details about the guideline. Again discard the ones that do not fit with these.
3. The final selection is from the full text of the rest.
4. For projects like these, using a sophisticated Reference Management system is vital.

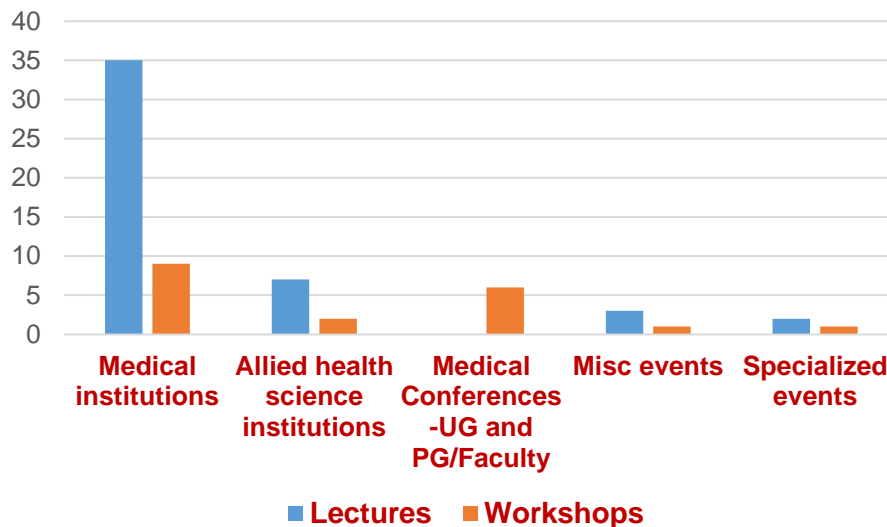

We conducted a workshop for under-graduate students of Seth GS Medical College and KEM Hospital which was not a part of any conference or allied event.

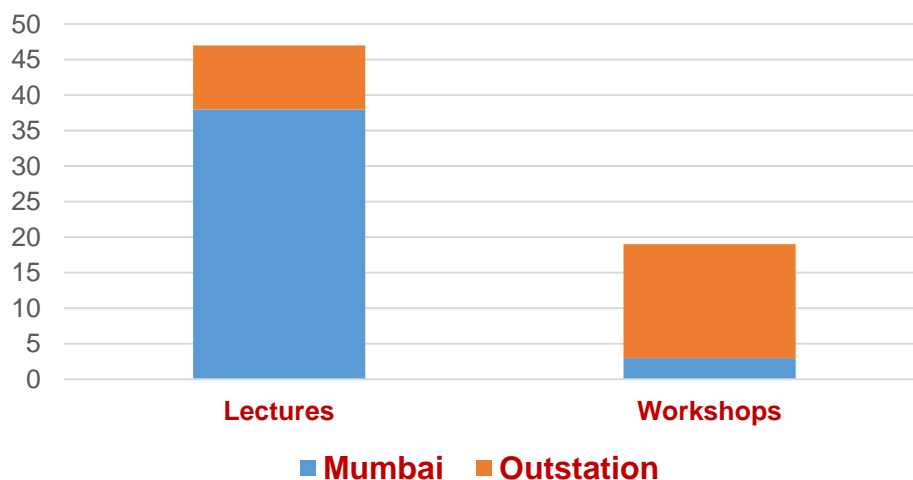
Training for Guideline Developers

We did a full day workshop for a group of Public Health Researchers on "Resources in Ethics" at Narotam Sekhsaria Foundation.

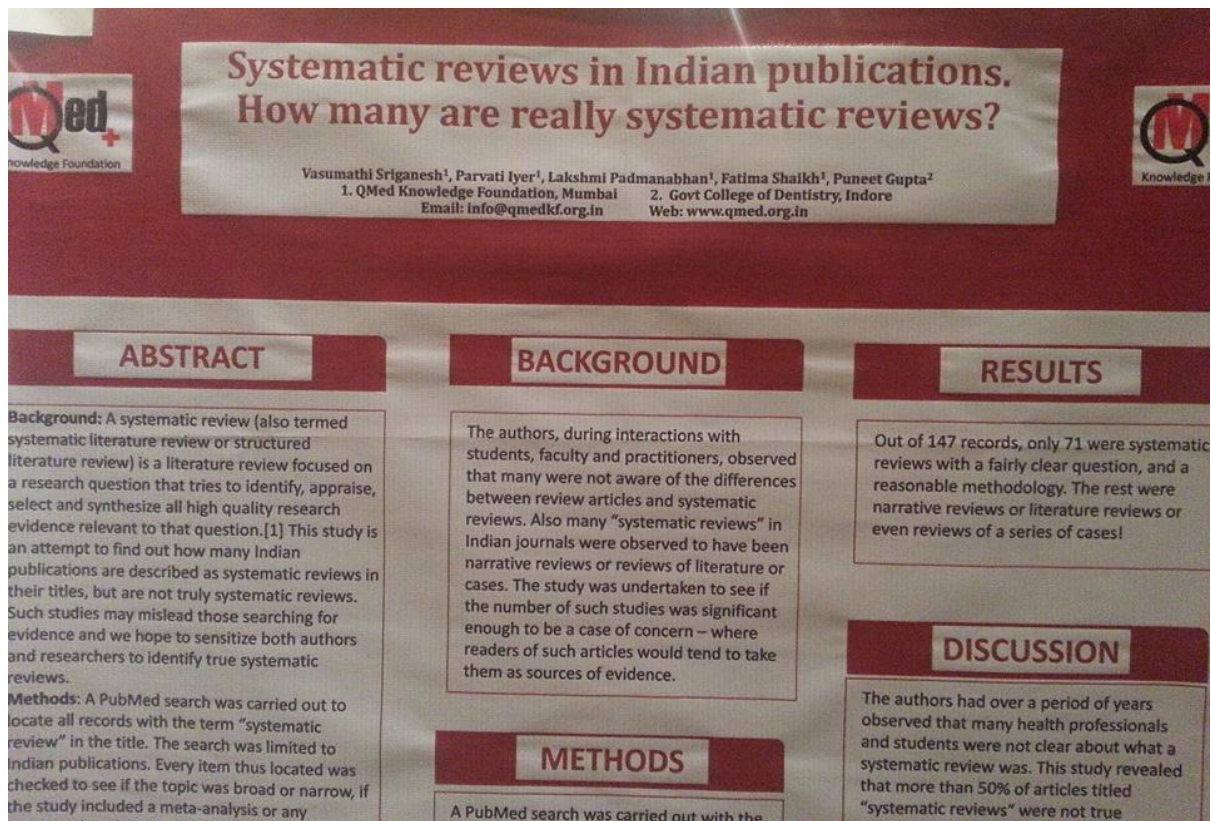

QMed's Poster Presented at the conference of World Association of Medical Editors (WAME 2015)

This study, presented at WAME 2015, is an attempt to find out how many Indian publications are described as systematic reviews in their titles, but are not truly systematic reviews. Such studies may mislead those searching for evidence and we hope to sensitize both authors and researchers to identify true systematic reviews. We retrieved articles from PubMed, published in Indian journals and had the words Systematic Review in the title and checked them to see whether they were systematic reviews produced following the necessary methodology, or if they were review articles.



We found that a little less than 50% of the 147 articles were systematic reviews.

We recommend that journal editors and peer reviewers *must* tell authors of such papers, to amend the title to Review of literature, or just a Review.

A Major Question

Our core activity is empowering health professionals (including students) by training and mentoring. This training will contribute to provision of evidence based health care

Our question: Who should fund this? The Government? The Community? Or the end users? Or a mix of all?

This is a question that challenges us every year.

If it is the Government, should it be the Medical Council of India, the Indian Council of Medical Research, the Public Health Foundation of India – or a mix of all and more? If yes to any one or more, who is ready to help us not just reach the right people, but work with us, to make this happen soon?

If it is the Community, (which is what it is, in addition to the Founder's family funding) – who in the Community should we target? How do we get a critical mass audience to fund us regularly?

Is it our target audience – the doctors / nurses / professionals and students? The community at large believes that they can pay to learn from us. But... here are hurdles:

- 1) Individual students / professionals have the impression that we should not charge for our workshops or we should subsidize them heavily. They are so used to subsidies that they don't stop to think of what it costs us to give them our offering.
- 2) Institutions seem to be unable to decide which budget to utilize for the workshops, and are never sure if they should charge their participants, because of the latter's perceptions

The last option – which is in process – seems to be the most optimistic. Our E-Learning programs can reach out to a far larger target audience and with the most affordable payment options, we should be able to not only reach a stage of self-sustenance, but maybe we could, in future fund some research projects. But till then, we do need funding.

We seek answers and help to overcome these challenges!

The most important reason being that literature search is not considered significant enough in the area of research as is statistics or any other research related topic.</p>	<p>To reach out to more institutions we hit upon an idea. Wherever UG conferences were being organized, we requested the host institution to conduct a workshop for their PG/Faculty one day prior or after the UG event. Almost all of them agreed to this arrangement. We also offered an alternative – ‘interactive workshops’ (which are shorter in duration and open for a larger audience). This mode of workshop does not include hands-on activity hence the logistics of organizing an interactive session is easier.</p> <p>Results: Workshops: 19 Number of participants: 495</p>

QMed Participates

‘Be a leader’

Fatima and Lakshmi attended a one-day GYAN (Get Your Answers Now) session on ‘Be a Leader’ organized by I-Volunteer, Mumbai. The two speakers for the workshop shared interesting inputs on employee engagement, being a team player and giving effective feedback. The topic was dealt with in an informal way focusing more on the participant’s experiences rather than mere theory. This made the entire workshop a great learning experience.

Social Business Summit – “Empowering NGOs for Future

Vasumathi Sriganesh attended an event – “Social Business Summit – “Empowering NGOs for Future” – organized by the Don Bosco Institute of Management & Research. There were interesting talks and panel discussions on empowerment of NGOs and the DBIMR shared with us, the work done by their Management Students on Social projects during their PG degree course. (It is mandatory for them!) . We hope to use the learning from this and explore possibility of having a student from DBIMR engage with us sometime.

Google Ad Grants Workshop

Lakshmi Padmanabhan attended a training on ‘Google Ad Grants’ organized by the Google Ad Grants training team (India) specially for the non-profit sector. The team gave an overview of the various methods which NGOs can use to leverage Google ads to promote their work, raise funds and appeal to volunteers. We hope to leverage this learning in the near future, to generate funds for our activities

Fund-raising Workshop

CEDSS – SPJIMR – Workshop on fundraising. Ms Usha Menon – a highly experienced fund raiser and consultant shared some excellent ideas for NGOs to raise funds.

Looking Forward: 2016-2017

- ❖ Mentor under-graduate students who are working on the ICMR STS projects.
- ❖ Launch e-learning courses on Information Resources, Literature Search and Reference Management.
- ❖ Organize train the trainer programs.
- ❖ Conduct training programs for librarians working in health science colleges/hospitals so that they can ensure optimum utilization of the library resources and become a point of contact for the students and professionals of the institution for this subject.
- ❖ Encourage medical institutions to conduct literature search and reference management training programs for the under-graduate students.
- ❖ Make our workshops a regular feature in the PG orientation programs.

About QMed

The problem: a lacuna in medical education & research in India

The medical curriculum in India does not incorporate the required training to search and retrieve health information with the *systematic approach that is required*. To add to it today there is an overload of information available especially on the internet. Health professionals tend to rely on the most accessible and easily available information compromising on its authenticity, reliability and accuracy. This directly impacts patient care. The patient / consumer community also search generic search engines and rely on the flood of social media messages they get, for health information. As a result, they are often misinformed. This could also create a major problem in the communications with doctors while receiving medical care.

What we do and how we do it:

We teach health science professionals (medical students, doctors, allied health professionals, researchers & librarians) to search for health information from recognized online resources in a systematic manner, so that healthcare will be provided based on the best of updates and evidence, from the world literature. We conduct training programs in medical institutes and hospitals in India and organize a few on our own to impart literature search and reference management skills. In future, we plan to teach consumers how to find reliable and authentic information, so that they interact with their healthcare providers and share the responsibility of their healthcare decisions.

QMed Knowledge Foundation is a not-for-profit Trust set up in 2007, working in the area of medical education and research.
