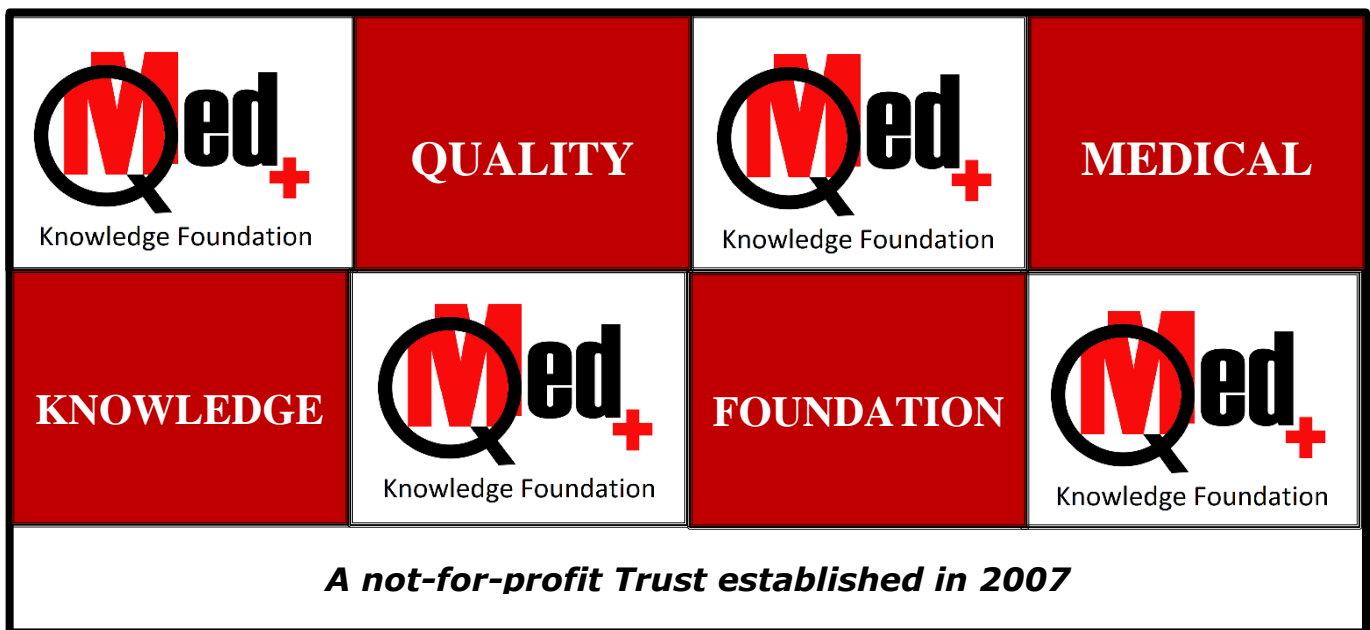

From the CEO's Table

This year started with what none of us would have ever expected in our lifetimes. The pandemic and the lockdown. From about the second week of March 2020, as there were rumblings about possible lockdowns, we started getting prepared for working from home. And just as we had all our plans ready, the lockdown was announced. We really felt relieved that we had done our planning in advance.

We had planned a complete revamping of our online courses and the movement of these courses to our own platform. Also this year we had the release of the new PubMed and we needed to make our courses with the new front end. In April and May, we re-created all the presentations by breaking the lessons into smaller fragments. We had planned to have short modules so that busy residents and doctors could view one video at a time, when they had breaks. The recordings were all done in a bedroom at home – planning for a reasonable background, testing the lighting and then checking for minimal external noises. By the end of May we had 90 videos recorded.

Our colleague Fatima had meanwhile done all the ground work planning for the Moodle site, and next arranged to upload all the videos and link them. On the 14th of June, the new E-learning site was successfully launched. In July, within a couple of weeks of the launch we had the first institution take up the access – this was AIIMS Bhubaneswar! Over the next few months we had the Regional Medical Research Centre (an ICMR Unit) from Bhubaneswar also join us. The next was Karunashraya – a Palliative Care Centre from Bengaluru. Meanwhile three MAHE institutions – KMC Mangalore, KMC Manipal and the Sikkim Manipal Institute of Medical Sciences were also on board; they had earlier taken up access to our online courses via the Mediknit platform (where we had first started). We migrated all their registered users to our current platform.

We did observe that thanks to the pandemic, very few institutions were in a position to consider paying us for access to our courses, even though we made them extremely affordable. And yet thanks to large number of people enrolled, we had to plan for cloud hosting and larger space. We did a crowd funding campaign and collected enough to cover the hosting costs for about 12-14 months.

The other important point that we noticed is that though the MCI's undergraduate curriculum document mentioned that every medical graduate must have searching skills, hardly any institution thought of including UG students to utilize our course offerings. So we arrived at another model to encourage UG students. We started another crowdfunding campaign to college funds so that we offered it to UG students virtually free. We decided to ask them to give us a donation of Rs 250/- - more as a commitment to learn. And planned for rewards and prizes if they finished the courses in a month and scored reasonably well.

In November 2020, we launched a new free course-Introduction to Referencing. Forty people registered and nine completed the course on the same day. Later during the year, we had had a total of around 350

individuals registering, and around 250 of them completed the course. Institutions who subscribed to our courses automatically had access to this course.

Later in the year, we had Sri Manakula Vinayagar Medical College & Hospital, Puducherry, AIIMS – Guwahati and Apollo Tele Health Services joining us. The older institutions also added more people – residents & faculty who joined them later. At the end of the year – we had a total of over 2600 registered users. We conducted webinars for two of these institutions and are planning to do more for all. As of March 2021, we have also billed two more institutions and await their joining us.

The other interesting shift this year was from lectures to webinars. I delivered 27 webinars this year and only one live lecture at several research methodology workshops as well as at some other events.

From the pool of people who did our courses, I guided about six people who were authoring systematic reviews, for working on their search strategies. They studied the Advanced Modules in the PubMed course, then created their strategies and sent them to me. After my reviewing them, we would plan a video call and I would comment on their strategies, demonstrate some better options or corrections, using a shared screen and then they would work on it again. I would do one or more reviews of their work if needed. And then I would guide them for searching other databases too.

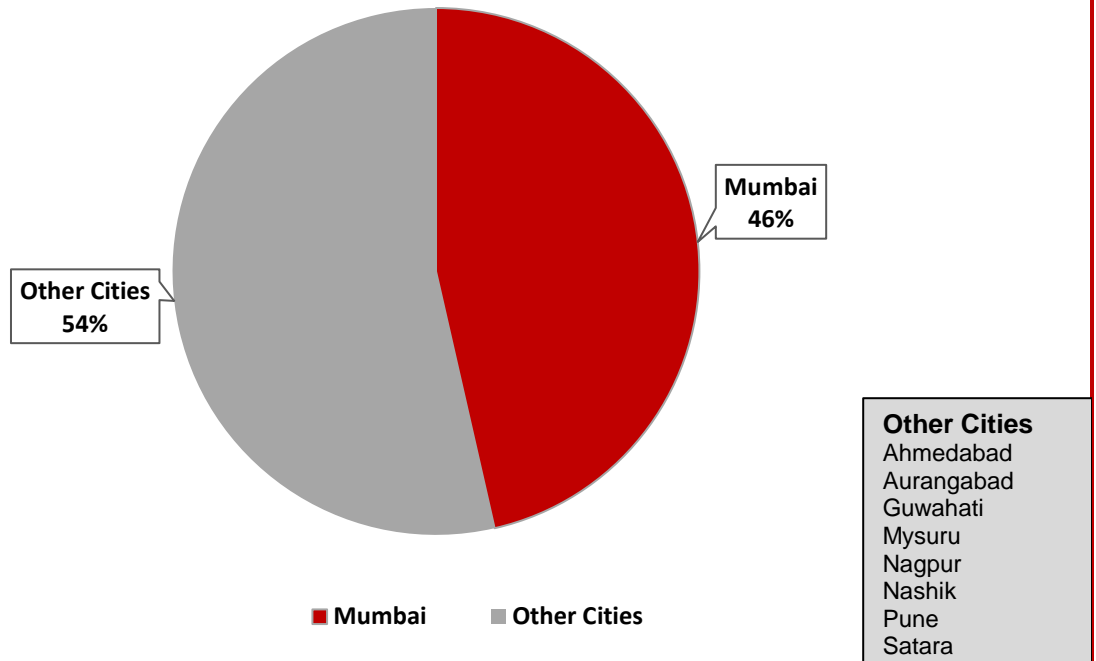

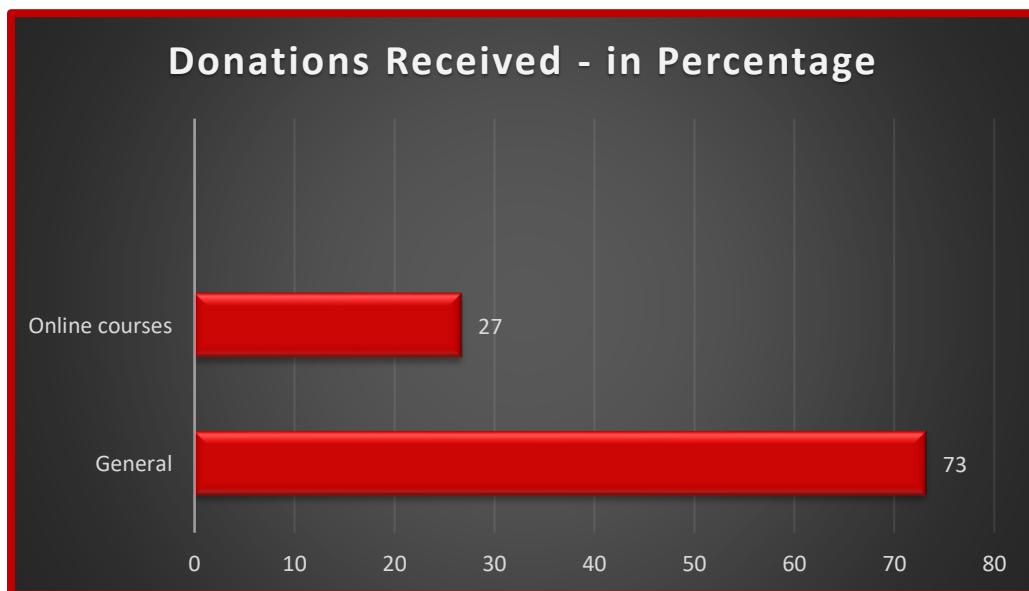
